





# Year 3 Author Visit


Below are some of the responses from the students following the wonderful opportunity to speak with the author first hand. Pip has kindly offered to join the group again for a post reading novel discussion.


# Year 2 Poetry




#### My Sandwich


I want a big cheese sandwich now.

I bit the sandwich it did the trick


